CLASS OFFERED (PRIMARILY) TO STUDENTS IN:

Education, Architecture, Interior Design, Art, and Visual Communication Design Other students can take this course with permission of the instructor

STUDENTS ADMITTED:

Selection by Professor, based on students who express an interest and *submit one artwork sample*. For this sample, wet media preferred but not required. Scan and send to the instructor.

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course is an introduction to the fundamentals of transparent watercolor, and an exploration of the uses of wet media for:

- 1) Design Ideas. Quick, exuberant expressions.
- 2) Sketches from life. Observed subjects, models, still lifes, landscapes, and scenery.
- 3) Finished Pieces. Artistic renderings.

Units will include history and utilization of watercolors, basics of composition and layout, monochrome pieces emphasizing value, color pigments, washes and layering, brushwork and wet on wet, traditional and experimental techniques, and unique creative projects. Along the way, students will deepen both perceptual and creative skills, and deepen aesthetic appreciation through appraisal of each other's' projects.

Teachers will be given a special unit in assessing student progress in watercolors, and assisting in the development of individualized processes.

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

- A. Knowledge
- 1. Fundamental tools and materials of watercolor painting.
- 2. Basic techniques and principles applicable to the art of watercolor painting.
- 3. Terminology used in to the practice of watercolors
- B. Skills
- 1. Correct technical use of tools and materials of the watercolor medium
- 2. Facility in handling watercolor paints
- 4. Demonstration of a variety of basic watercolor techniques, and correct utilization of brushes and other tools
- 3. Higher acuity in sensory perception
- C. Attributes
- 1. Intuition in the creation of quick design sketches.
- 2. Discipline and accuracy in the creation of sketches from life.
- 3. Practice and perseverance in the creation of final pieces.

COURSE SCHEDULE:

READINGS on History and Application of Watercolor will be assigned and received via the Kent State Vista teaching and learning interface on alternate Tuesdays.

CLASSES will be held on Saturdays, with two to three out of class field excursions

UNIT ONE - WATERCOLOR FOR DESIGN.

- JAN 30: Introduction to the tools, materials, medium, and procedures. Review of fundamentals of loose, accurate freehand drawing. Elementary exercises with fast brushwork and calligraphic brushstrokes. Utilization of watercolor as a quick sketching medium for design ideas. First assignment group: Free, expressionist watercolor sketches of DESIGN IDEAS in your area of expertise or interest.
- FEB 6: Work with four methods of application of color. Experimentation with transparency and layering of monochrome washes. Additional free, abstract, and design watercolors.
- FEB 13: Additional design watercolors. Work with experimental and unorthodox methods. Lifting with tissues, salt, scraping, splattering, and wraps. Masking and resist.
- FEB 20: Design watercolors substantial completion. Finish in this class, with class appraisal and group critique at the end of class.

UNIT TWO - WATERCOLOR FROM LIFE.

- FEB 27:Abstracted realism with still lives. Emphasis on the depiction of light.
Second assignment group:Watercolors from observed sources.
Persons, Places, Things.
- MAR 6: Additional still lives. Expressionistic treatment. Mixed media.
- MAR 13: Figure drawing / painting slated, pending model availability.
- MAR 20: SATURDAY. Field Trip, 10 AM 5 PM. Weather permitting. Site to be a)Stan Hywet Hall OR b)Downtown Akron
- MAR 27: Watercolor from life substantial completion. Finish in this class, with class appraisal and group critique at the end of class.

UNIT THREE - WATERCOLOR FOR FINISHED RENDERINGS.

- APR 3: Determination of image and treatment. Begin tracing with light table. Masking as necessary. Introduction of first washes. Final assignment group: Finished large rendering. APR 10: Continue progress on large painting APR 17: As above APR 24: As above MAY 1: SATURDAY. Field Trip, 10 AM – 5 PM. Weather permitting. Site to be a) Downtown Cleveland OR b) University Circle **MAY 8:** Final Review.
